Local leaders discuss, pass policy at annual meeting

Coke County was represented at the annual meeting of the state's largest general farm and organization ranch in December. Two delegates from Coke County Farm Bureau traveled to Frisco December 1-3 where they helped shape the policy direction of Texas Farm Bureau (TFB).

"Texas Farm Bureau is a grassroots organization," John Ross Copeland, Coke County Farm Bureau president, said. "The needs of the entire state are considered by the voting delegate body to help address issues related to farmers, ranchers rural and communities."

Voting delegates discussed the 1944 water treaty between the U.S. and Mexico, supporting stronger efforts to ensure that water delivery to the Rio Grande and annual allocations are strictly honored instead of carried over into a five-year reporting cycle.

They also discussed hydrogen energy projects, issuing support for state oversight of all aspects of the projects, providing landowner education and safety, and studying the impact of these projects on agriculture and wildlife.

On the national level, voting delegates supported a resolution that would provide disaster assistance for poultry growers, along with a resolution that supports activities and legislation that discourages the unnecessary loss of productive farmland.

The TFB Annual Meeting includes district meetings for members, a business session, exhibits from companies offering TFB members benefits and young farmer and rancher competitions.

Several reunion activities and a 90th anniversary celebration and dinner were also part of the meeting festivities. Two-Time Entertainer of the Year Neal McCoy headlined the event.

"Ongoing drought conditions



once again brought challenges for agriculture, but we've continued to grow our crops and raise livestock," John Ross said. "The annual meeting was a chance for farmers and ranchers from across the state to share concerns, discuss solutions and to help move agriculture forward."

The Local Livestock Show

To Americans, that history dates to March 1896, when a small exhibition of animals was held under shade trees in Fort Worth, Texas. That event spawned interest and other similar events. Within a decade, the event now known as the Fort Worth Stock Meeting in Frisco: Kade and Morgan Hodges.

State resolutions adopted at the TFB annual meeting become policies that guide the organization in 2024. National resolutions adopted by the voting delegates are sent to the Bureau American Farm Federation for consideration in its resolutions process.

Show and Rodeo would be joined by the American Royal in Kansas City, the National Western Stock Show in Denver, and the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago. In each case, ranchers and stockmen came from afar to the "City" to exhibit their animals in competition with one another.

My first livestock show was the State Fair of Texas in the fall of 1993. My hog and I quickly got the gate. In the interim between 1896 and 1993, the concept of the livestock show grew and changed wildly. Competition between ranchers and stockmen still exists, but the livestock show also grew into an industry in itself, with animal breeders and feed and supply companies rising up to serve the market of 4-H and FFA members who competed with one another in cattle, hog, sheep, goat, poultry,
