Hornets can't stop Gorillas

The Blackwell Hornets lost last Friday evening to the Trent Gorillas, 65-16.

The Hornets scored with a run by Jayden Jones for a touchdown and on a pass from Ethan Andrews to Mason Magness for a touchdown. Both conversions by Matthew Meyer were good.

Jayden carried the ball 8 times for 35 yards rushing, caught the ball 3 times for 45 yards, returned 2 kickoffs for 46 yards, had five tackles, and three assists.

Mason Magness had 50 yards from passes by Ethan Andrews, had 2 tackles and 1 assist.

Ethan Andrews threw the ball 29 times with 10 completions for 133 yards, 4 interceptions and 1 touchdown. He carried the ball 3 times to post another 22 yards. He also had 1 kickoff return for 7 yards.

Ted Chambliss caught 2 passes for 11 yards, had 4 tackles, 1 assist and 1 hurry.

Kaleb Edwards caught 2 passes for 21 yards, ran back two kickoff returns for 18 yards, had 3 tackles and 1 assist.

Franck Cano carried the ball once for 11 yards.

Mark Monroe caught the ball once for 6 yards, kicked the ball 3 times for 45 yards, and had 1 assist.

Over \$63,000 in scholarships awarded to BHS grads

At the September 21, 2011 meeting of the Blackwell Consolidated Educational Foundation, the board of directors approved \$63,378.70 in scholarships for Blackwell graduates.

Students, including transfers, who graduate from Blackwell High School can earn up to \$3,000 per year of attendance for trade school, two-year, and/or four-year university study.

This year's recipients received anywhere between \$500 and \$4,500 for the fall semester. In all, 28 former students and BHS graduates received scholarships. Scholarships are awarded each September and January.

The foundation was created in July, 2010 to assist students in furthering their education.

together to deliver the more than 95 projects, opportunities, and events offered annually through the program.

4-H is unique in that it offers experiences to the most urban young person and youth in rural areas by providing the opportunity to participate in community 4-H clubs, learning experiences in school classrooms, day and overnight camps, and other special interest opportunities. Texas 4-H also serves the sons and daughters of our military personnel through the 4-H Military Program located throughout the state, primarily on military bases.

Youth members can participate in a variety of projects in the areas of technology, human sciences, animals and household pets, science and engineering, natural resources, and wildlife. Beyond the excitement of learning something new through a project, youth have the opportunity to participate in leadership conferences, travel the world, become involved in their community through service, and meet new friends in a safe and comfortable setting. A young person's experiences in 4-H makes a difference for a lifetime by allowing them to grow and appreciate the importance of being a good citizen, a strong leader, and a
