77 fifth and sixth grade students from Bronte and Robert Lee elementary schools gathered at the historical Fort Chadbourne Ranch for a fun filled day of soil and water conservation education. The morning session began at 9:30 a.m.

Garland and Lana Richards along with Ann Pate and Brent Bryan of the Fort Chadbourne Foundation, played host to Station #1 which included a tour of the awesome new visitors' center. They briefed the students was established in 1852 by Companies A & K of the 8th US Infantry. The Fort was put here to protect early settlers who were making their way west during the Gold Rush in California. The Fort was surrendered in 1861 to the quality of water runoff Texas Troops at the outbreak of the Civil War. Following the war, the 4th US Cavalry returned in 1867 to reestablish Fort Chadbourne. Due to severe drought conditions, and no water or supplies readily available, a decision was made to abandon Fort Chadbourne and establish a new post, Fort Concho in present day San Angelo. In

The Coke County Soil and 1877, Thomas and Lucinda Water Conservation District Odom purchased the Fort to hosted the fifth annual Coke establish Chadbourne Ranch. County Conservation Field Although the names have changed from Odom, Wylie, and Richards, the same family owns it today making Water eight generations that have resided on the ranch.

Wade Day, assisted by Improvement District, Texas Jacob Maenius, NRCS, hosted Station #2. Using a watershed model they explained that proper farming practices, correct usage of chemicals on fields and lawns, disposal of oil and chemicals play a vital role in the quality of water heading into our streams and rivers.

James Jackson, Texas Agridonations from our co-spon- Life Extension, Station #3, sors, students and adults had the students actively applying rain harvesting methods. They used a water filled coffee can with holes for rain on top of a tin roof with guttering and a collection bucket signifying a water tank to store the rain water to use in times of need or for everyday use.

> Joe Franklin and Ryan McClintock, NRCS assisted by volunteer, Quentin Holik, hosted Station #4. They discussed with the students the needs of plants and animals including daily requirements of food and water for each with students acting the role of different animals.
