Coke County farmers, ranchers help shape national agriculture policy

A resolution important to Coke County farmers and ranchers, pushed by the Texas Farm Bureau, helped to create and change national policy at the American Farm Bureau Annual Convention in San Diego earlier this month.

"One of the most important actions was making sure that ranchers drive future decisions on the Beef Checkoff and its marketing and research programs," John Ross Copeland, Coke County Farm Bureau president, said. "It's key that the people raising cattle oversee the programs designed to help them

The action was made in response to the Secretary of Agriculture's move to collect an additional dollar for the national Beef Checkoff in addition to the dollar already approved by

promote the sale of beef."

ranchers in a 1986 referendum. "We support the Beef Checkoff and its programs," John Ross said. "But we feel the secretary's approach doesn't provide safeguards for rancher control of the program we fund."

Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack claimed authority under a 1996 act to ask for the additional dollar per head of cattle sold for the national Beef Checkoff. Due to the Texas delegations' efforts, the AFBF delegates in San Diego rejected the claim.

Texas adopted a state checkoff provision in 2014.

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
