New Lessons of Nehemiah (Also: American Shutdown **Encouragement #6)**

by James M. Decker (Author's note: this is an updated version of an essay I wrote during Easter week in 2019. I thought it was appropriate to share, given the unique circumstances of Easter

Nehemiah is one of my favorite leaders in the Bible, for several reasons. Nehemiah was a Jewish exile who was cupbearer to King Artaxerxes of Persia. The king controlled the areas that formerly belonged to the Jewish kingdoms of Israel and Judah after they collapsed. Nehemiah earned the trust of the king, who permitted him to travel to Jerusalem to aid the residents who were suffering and rebuild the walls of the city.

I once wrote an essay called "Walls to Build" that discussed Nehemiah rebuilding the walls

of Jerusalem. He did it with no experience and in a hostile environment. Neighboring tribes threatened to overrun the city and did not want to see the walls rebuilt to their former strength. The Book Nehemiah speaks of the workers undertaking the job with a shovel in one hand and a sword in the other. In that essay, I encouraged each of us to take inspiration from Nehemiah's wall-building to rebuild the proverbial walls of rural America. Nehemiah's wallbuilding wasn't the only magnificent project undertook to rejuvenate Jerusalem and its people. It had been many generations since the people had heard the Laws given by God to Moses, so Nehemiah worked with the priest Ezra to restore the peoples'knowledge of the Law and to restore their covenant with God.

Late in the Book of Nehemiah, the people made a covenant with God to deliver to the temple their first fruits as a tithe to God - the best of their

grain, livestock, wine, olive oil, for yourself. and so on. This was given for several reasons. First, it was a sign of obedience to God, to give your first fruits to him, and be blessed for your faithfulness, rather than selfishly keep them

Second. these supplies would sustain the priests who served the people in the temple and would provide for the widows and orphans as a social safety net.
