As of Tuesday, March 31, 2020, worldwide there have been 838,061 cases of Covid-19 with 41,261 deaths and 175,727 recoveries. Of these 838,061 cases worldwide, 177,452 are in the United States with 3,440 deaths.

As of 8 pm Monday, March 30, 2020, 42,992 Texans had been tested for the virus. Of those 42,992 tested, there are 3,266 confirmed cases spread over 122 of Texas' 254 counties. Forty-one Texans have lost their lives to the virus

as of presstime. In Texas, 7.5% of all people tested are confirmed to have the virus, and of those confirmed cases, 1.25% result in death. Worldwide, the rate of death of those confirmed to have Covid-19 comes in 4.92%. For the United States, the death rate if 1.938%.

A regressive timeline of the pandemic begins below.

March 2020

All Covid-19 testing restrictions were lifted early in the month. Cancellations, closures and shelter in place orders followed for many areas.

Many states are under shelter in place orders with travel now being restricted between certain states and certain states are under quarantine. Unofficial studies are being done on certain drugs and drug combinations to treat Covid-19. Results appear to be successful when patients are prescribed the combination hydroxychloroquine and Azithromycin. A new Covid-19 test has been released where results are available within minutes and a vaccine is in the first stage of clinical trials.

February 2020

President Trump forms a task force of the top scientific medical professionals led by Vice President Pence. On the 29th, a travel ban was imposed on Iran and new travel restrictions imposed on Italy and South Korea. Regulations on Covid-19 testing were relaxed.

January 31, 2020

President Trump declares a public health emergency and imposes a ban on travel to and from China. Mandatory two week quarantines were imposed on United States citizens coming from affected area.

January 23, 2020

China closes off the city of Wuhon completely to slow the spread of the coronavirus to the rest of China.

January 21, 2020

The first person with coronavirus arrives in the United States from China, having been in Wuhan.

January 7, 2020

The coronavirus is identified.

December 30, 2019

The World Health Organization discovers an unknown virus with pneumonialike symptoms first observed in the Wuhan province area of China.

Endurance

by James M. Decker Last time, I encouraged each of us to make time during our ongoing national shutdown to find some good books to read. I had just started "Endurance: Shackleton's Incredible Journey." It didn't take me long to finish. It was simply that good and that meaningful.

Sir Ernest Shackleton was an Irish explorer who attempted the

first land crossing of Antarctica. With 28 men and his ship Endurance, Shackleton sailed into Antarctic waters on December 5, 1914. Two days later, his expedition encountered pack ice. They fought on, until becoming trapped in the ice in January 1915. For eight months, they drifted in the ice until their ship was crushed in October. What came next is almost impossible to imagine. The men camped on the ice floes and hiked towards land for six months. In April 1916, they set out across the violent sea in tiny lifeboats. In August, 22 months after leaving South America, the entire expedition was rescued. Shackleton hadn't lost a man.

A century later, Shackleton's expedition is famous for its perseverance. Leadership experts praise Shackleton leadership amidst adversity. Those experts are correct - poor leaders don't bring 28 men through two years in the harshest conditions. However, this is more than a textbook leadership Sometimes, our world tends to airbrush its history. In the real world, heroes aren't always flawless, fearless leaders. They and their stories are much more complicated.

Shackleton spent much of his life searching for fulfillment through adventures and ill-fated business schemes.
