

Bronte ISD Gifted and Talented **Program Update**

The Bronte Elementary Gifted and Talented Program has been working on a Texas Performance Standards Project. The TPSP is a statewide standards and assessment system you can use to capture the high levels of achievement gifted/talented students. The goal of the TPSP is for students to create work that reflects the professional quality that the Texas State Plan for the Education of Gifted/Talented Students requires. Student projects are TEKS-based and focus on the core content areas of English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies with interdisciplinary connections.

The 6th Grade Gifted and Talented class is working on a budget project to solve a "real-life" school issue. Students were hypothetically given one million dollars to use to solve the school issue and they chose to build a new middle school annex for 6th, 7th, and 8th graders. Like architects, students drew the new building to scale, and the new area had to meet all American Disability Act standards, making the facility handicapped accessible. Sixth graders then completed a trifold display to show details of their research.
