(Continued from page 11) treatment plant. The City Secretary reported that consumption on the referenced course and club house the last two months ranged from 43,000 to 65,000 gallons. The Council discussed alternate water

options for the golf course to obtain effluent water for this portion also. Following further discussion, Gary Payne moved to deny the request for variance and for city personnel to work with the Golf Course to provide an alternate source of water. The motion was seconded by Sid Burns. The motion carried.

Mayor Jacobs read a letter from Rhonda Askins, Rhonda Askins' Car Wash, addressing the recently implemented outdoor water restriction plan that prohibits washing cars. Ms. Askins stated in her letter with an attached water consumption report, that the business' consumption was considerably less than most households or businesses. She also pointed out that her business is a tax-paying entity as are other businesses which have not been required to close. Following discussion, Sid Burns moved to approve a variance for this business. The motion was seconded by Richard Johnson. The motion carried. Voting is as follows: Ayes – Sid Burns, Richard Johnson and Gary Payne; Nays - Janie Munoz and Troy Wimberley.

The City Council discussed enforcement issues regarding violations of the outdoor watering restrictions. Mayor Jacobs addressed the recently implemented restrictions, stating that a copy of these restrictions was mailed out with the water bills at the end of April. Consumption reports from meter reading were still high and will be reviewed again following May meter readings. The code officer stated that he had been monitoring the outdoor watering at different times and will continue to monitor the situation. The Council will review consumption and demand reports at the next meeting and take further action if necessary.

Ron Dickey, Animal Control Officer, presented his April report. Following discussion, Richard Johnson moved for approval, seconded by Troy Wimberley. The motion carried.

Marshall Millican, Code Enforcement Officer, presented his April report. Follwing a review of this report and questions regarding the availability and accessibility of the Municipal Judge, Janie Munoz moved to approve the report. The motion was seconded by Troy Wimberley and carried. Janie Munoz requested an agenda item be added to the June meeting to discuss the Municipal Judge

position regarding availability and accessibility of the current municipal judge, George Brickey.

Mayor Jacobs reported an onsite visit of the water treatment plant on April 14 by Teresa Rogers and Jack Schultz of the TCEQ mCPE compliance team. The team discussed the proposed strategy in response to the three year extension request specifically regarding the disinfectant protocol and clarifier trough repair. TCEQ proposed to extend the CAP deadline for installing the disinfectant equipment to meet the September 29, 2011, enforcement order requirements, to consider the CAP closed if all other requirements are met by September with the exception of the clarifier trough repair, and to return to compliance the historical violations associated with the surface water treatment rule if all other requirements are met by September. The group discussed the option to use chlorine dioxide as a disinfectant to reduce disinfection byproducts and meet CAP requirements by September 2011, as well as to begin to meet the requirements of the existing Agreed Order. Also discussed was the use of granular activated carbon

filtration media. Mr. Fred Teagarden, UCRA, provided an update on the status of the lake and on the pending activities related to funding a well production to provide an additional water source to the City. Mayor Jacobs stated that reluctantly an agreement was made on behalf of the city of the proposed strategy mentioned above.

The Council considered a declaration to forgo the competitive bidding procedures under Chapter 252 of the Local Government Code to purchase disinfection equipment and contracts which are necessary to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the city's residents as ordered by TCEQ in the Mandatory Compliance Action Plan. This declaration is necessary to acquire the equipment and contract necessary to meet the TCEQ proposed CAP strategy and deadlines of the disinfectant protocol. Following discussion, Gary Payne moved to approve the declaration. The motion was seconded by Troy Wimberley and the motion carried.

Mayor Jacobs stated that a Lease Purchase Agreement with

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Siemons Company for a chlorine dioxide generator, maintenance, and chemicals will be required in order to meet mCPE CAP compliance with the disinfectant protocol. It was noted that the company had not had sufficient time to prepare this agreement. Troy Wimberley moved that, due to the time constraints, authorization be granted to Mayor Jacobs to execute a Lease Purchase Agreement with Siemons Company. The motion was seconded by Janie Munoz. The motion carried.

Water Treatment Plant operator Justin Brickey was not present at the meeting due to illness. The City Secretary reported on the remaining corrective action items of the CAP. The lagoon project is in progress. Comments were received regarding the regulatory compliance plan previously submitted. Comments will be incorporated into the plan. The SCADA system has been installed and operators trained. Monthly reports are being submitted as required.

Mayor Jacobs reported on the

Wildcat Fire, April 11 through May 2, 2011. The Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department repairs and fuel has been estimated at \$4,000. It is unclear if all the bills have been presented. A Forest Service truck is completely down and will be returned to the Forest Service. The department will look at other avenues in which to replace this truck. Donations received to date are approximately \$35,815.00. Mayor Jacobs read a debriefing from the Fire Department. There were approximately 996.7 firefighter hours and 254 hours from the Mayor, City Secretary, and City Superintendent. Major Jacobs stated that he did not have an estimated report regarding the amount of water provided by the City during this fire. He said that City Attorney Nancy Arthur was looking over the contract with CRMWD to see if the City had any rights to require CRMWD to stop pumping from Lake Spence. State Representative Drew Darby's office is aware of the critical water supply issues.

Reports and Information

1. Mayor's Report

a. The 2009 TCDP filter rehab project will be closed out. Project is complete.

b. The Water Association Meeting/Fish Fry is scheduled for May 19 in the school cafeteria.

c. Fred Teagarden, UCRA, provided outstanding assistance with the Standard Operating Procedures as required under the TCEQ mCPE compliance action plan. The plan has been submitted for comment to TCEO.

d. Linda Barrera completed the online Basic Water course and passed the D Water License exam. Dan Cantrell completed the Basic Wastewater Course at the Abilene Regional School and tested for his D Wastewater License. Justin Brickey completed the customer service inspection course at the Abilene Regional School and tested for his CSI license.

2. City Secretary Report

a. The Spring City-wide Cleanup on April 15-16th was a huge success. Two roll-offs of metal material and three roll-offs of mixed material were collected. The estimated payment from Acme Iron for the metal material

b. The Annual City Appreciation Dinner is slated for May 12 at 6 pm at Zentner's Steakhouse in San Angelo.

c. An Oath of Office Ceremony will be held May 20 at 9 am at City Hall for installation of the elected officers – Janie Munoz, Tommy Roach and Jeanette Meeks.

3. Superintendent Report

a. Report on work orders completed and ongoing activity at utility departments. Contractors have finished with filter rehab project. City-wide cleanup was a success. Superintendent attended a drought seminar in Austin. The department tapped a 6" line on 12th Street and Washington Street to resolve low pressure problems. Currently, he is gathering door prizes for the TWUA meeting. He had a phone conference with Steve Dennis, Engineer, and TCEQ team about the chlorine dioxide generator for the disinfectant protocol.

b. He reported on upcoming items, finished old work order, cleaning of backwash lagoons, cleaning drying beds at the WWTP.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 pm.
