Even if the accurate quote is less snappy than the inaccurate one, the underlying principle is sound and something we should all think about in these trying times. We've had many trying times in our nation's history. My generation grew up in an era was relatively that unprecedented in terms of strife, both foreign and domestic, until the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. On the

other hand, prior generations witnessed a number of episodes reminding us that the American Experiment is messy, flawed, and a work in progress. They saw the country struggle with Vietnam. They saw Americans of all stripes fight for civil rights the 1960s and saw in segregationists fight back in horrifying ways. They saw a Cuban Missile Crisis that brought the world to the brink of nuclear war. They saw World War II, when the world united to defeat the march of fascism and genocide. They saw the Great Depression.

And those are just the generations who are living today. The reality is that these episodes punctuate the entirety of American history, dating back to the earliest stages of the American Revolution, when Crispus Attacks was gunned down by British soldiers at the Boston Massacre. America has faced innumerable challenges from bad men combining (to borrow from Burke's accurate quote). Each time, the good men associated together to turn back the tide of those men who were on the wrong side of history.

There's another, similar quote that comes to my mind. Yvon Chouinard is the founder of Patagonia, the American outdoors company known for its apparel, its environmental activism, and its dedication to promoting quality of life for its employees. Environmentalism is a whole other topic for a different day, but there are plenty of corporations and personalities who give lip service to the idea and live by the old "do as I say, not as I do" rule. Chouinard and Patagonia are known for putting their money where their mouth is. This dates to Chouinard's earliest days in business, when he forged and sold steel rock-climbing pitons to support his own rock-climbing adventures. Chouinard made an estimated 70% of his income off steel pitons, which were integral to rock climbing everywhere. When he realized that the pitons were damaging the rocks of his beloved Yosemite National Park, he devised new equipment that was much more environmentally sound and advocated "clean climbing," which destroyed his piton business in favor of his new products and which revolutionized the worldwide sport of rock climbing in a much more environmentally-conscious manner.

Chouinard has a powerful statement about doing good: "I have a little different definition of evil than most people. When you have the opportunity and the ability to do good and you do nothing, that's evil. Evil doesn't always have to be an overt act, it can be merely the absence of good."

I think all of us, me included, occasionally want to pat ourselves on the back for simply not doing the wrong thing. But Chouinard's quote puts into perspective the folly of that thinking. If a parent asks a child to help out around the house, then the child does nothing, does the parent give the child credit for simply not wrecking the house in lieu of doing what was requested? I never was that fortunate!

The same thing holds true here in the adult world. We can all look around and see the things of the world that need fixing. We see the evil that comes from Satan to tear apart our world (as stated eloquently by Tony Dungy in last week's essay). So what are we actually doing about it? I would hope we aren't overtly contributing to the bad, but are we contributing by merely being absent? Or are we using our ability and our opportunity to contribute to the good?
