

Rangeland Management Equals Water Management

An old topic to us all is brush management, as much as everyone likes to see a nice smooth pasture and one that is easy to move livestock and run a 4-wheeler across. We need to ask ourselves, do we sacrifice production for looks. In the dried out landscape of Coke County, I would like to throw out some food for thought. Keep every drop of water that falls on your place and all that your uphill neighbor will give you.

There are many practices that can help achieve this goal. These can include brush control, grazing intensity and riparian area management. Practices such as brush control are always thought decrease the amount of brush and increase the amount o f grass. However, let's also think of increasing water as well. During the drought that we have been in for the past few years, many pastures only have water in a depression in the ground, which could have been caused from clearing the brush. Now, as a result of clearing the brush and leaving the depression in the ground, you have a means of slowing down the water and holding it to grow grass.

Other means of pasture management to conserve water is grazing management. Grass roots serve many purposes. Two of the most basic are to take up nutrients from the soil and bring it to the plants and to keep the soil loose where water infiltrates into the soil instead of running off of the soil. The easiest way to maintain a good root system is to maintain good aboveground plant structure such as leaves and roots. By utilizing the old theory of leave half - take half, you will allow the aboveground portion of the plant to maintain enough structure to support the roots.

Another way to improve water with grazing management is to control the grazing in the riparian areas. Riparian areas are classified as the interface between the creek, river or stream. When proper management occurs, these areas can produce more vegetation then many land managers could ever imag-For a riparian area to maintain maximum production, it is necessary to hold off grazing until you can establish a stable plant community and stabilize the banks to prevent erosion. Once the banks get an established plant community, you can utilize this area with short duration grazing.

Bronte Longhorn Golf Club announces Summer Youth Golf Program


The Bronte Longhorn Golf Club will be hosting a Summer Youth Golf Program that is open to all area youth. This summer, learn to play golf or just improve your game.
