Farmers, ranchers urged to sign up for **Coronavirus Food Assistance Program**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Coronavirus Food Assistance (CFAP) Program provides financial much-needed assistance to farmers and ranchers who have suffered a five-percent-or-greater price decline or who had losses due to market supply chain disruptions due to COVID-19 and face additional significant market costs.

The program, announced by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue in mid-April, is currently accepting applications, and Coke County Farm Bureau urges eligible farmers and ranchers to apply.

"Our farmers and ranchers are hurting right now," Coke County Farm Bureau President

Farmers and ranchers selfcertify when applying for CFAP, FSA said. Documentation is not submitted with the application. Additional documentation to support the certification of eligible commodities may be requested later, however.




The Texas Department of

The campaign reminds drivers that motorcycles are small and can be hard to see.

In 2019, 412 motorcyclists were killed in Texas, and more than 1,800 were seriously injured.

"The six-month period from May through October is the deadliest for motorcycle riders and accounted for 61 percent of motorcycle fatalities in Texas last year," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass.
