Mrs. Virginia Jay has been indicted on two counts for misappropriation of city funds while serving as city secretary. The ingrand jury in 51st District Court just before noon Tuesday read: "Virginia Jay when serving as

city secretary of Robert Lee, Texas, and as such officer by virtue of said office, there had come unto and was then in her custody and possession, the sum of \$100.50 in money, the same being then and there the property of the said city of Robert Lee, and the Virginia Jay did then and there unlawfully and fraudently take and convert the same to her own

the sum of \$71.50. After the indictments were returned to Judge Joe L. Mays he fixed bond at \$1,000 on each count. Sheriff Paul Good served warrants on Mrs. Jay Tuesday evening and she expected to post the requir-

The referendum will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from producer payments earned under the wool incentive program. Funds collected are used by the American Sheep Producers Council to carry out a program of advertising, promotion, and related activities under an agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture.

The agreement, which has been in effect since the 1955 marketing year, will be extended for 3 years if approved in the September referendum. Producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum must approve if the agree ment is to be extended.

Deductions from wool and lamb payments under the new agreement would not exceed 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundred weight for unshorn lambs. Deductions at these rates have been made from payments for each marketing year since 1955.
