County Treasurer • Hal Spain • Elected to Office in 2010

The county treasurer, as the chief custodian of all county funds, including the general fund and special funds, such as those dedicated to a certain purpose and those under the control of an elected official other than the commissioners court. treasurer has a duty to receive all money received by the county from any source and place it in appropriate county depository. All county money received by any official must be delivered promptly to the county treasurer for proper handling.

The county treasurer is also responsible for disbursing county funds as directed by the commissioners court consistently with the law. The county treasurer often acts as the chief liaison between the county and all depository banks. In this capacity, he or she maintains records of all deposits and withdrawals, and reconciles all



4 Rings -Alarm Test bank statements, thus assuring their accuracy and the safety of county funds. The county treasurer, who may be designated as the county's investment officer, is required to submit regular reports to the commissioners court about the county's finances.

As with all elected county officials, the treasurer has ultimate authority over the operations of the office, including the authority to hire and fire personnel and direct their daily activities. The treasurer also has authority to determine how to use all other resources allocated to the office during the budget process.

Treasurer Hal Spain was an accomplished businessman before being elected as Treasurer. Raised in Haskell, he earned his Master Agricultural Education at Texas Tech University. He began his career with the Texas Extension Service, serving as an ag agent in several communities throughout the state. He moved to Coke County when he purchased The Observer/ Enterprise in 1983. He owned and operated the local newspaper until his election in 2010. An avid horseman, Spain served as a national director and Executive Secretary for national horse organizations. He and his wife Kimberly are active in Robert Lee's Methodist Church. Hal has two children, Wade Spain and Christi Spain Savage. He also has four grandchildren.



NOTICE OF 2017 TAX YEAR PROPOSED PROPERTY TAX RATE FOR COKE COUNTY

A tax rate of \$0.685409 per \$100 valuation has been proposed for adoption by the governing body of COKE COUNTY. This rate exceeds the lower of the effective or rollback tax rate, and state law requires that two public hearings be held by the governing body before adopting the proposed tax rate.

The governing body of COKE COUNTY proposes to use revenue attributable to the tax rate increase for the purpose of Maintenance and Operations and Salaries.

The effective tax rate is the total tax rate needed to raise the same amount of property tax revenue for COKE COUNTY from the same properties in both the 2016 tax year and the 2017 tax year.

The rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate that COKE COUNTY may adopt before voters are entitled to petition for an election to limit the rate that may be approved to the rollback rate.
