This past week I had the opportunity to attend the 58th annual Beef Cattle Short course held on campus at Texas A&M University. This course offers everything from update on long-term weather predictions,

rangeland management, reproductive physiology and beef cattle business management.

One of the sessions was Brian Bledsoe, weatherman for the Southern Livestock Standard, who was one of several featured speakers Monday during the general session Rudder a t Auditorium on the Texas A&M University campus. Bledsoe said the current weather patterns are reminiscent of the 1950s, but predicted West Texas and states such as Colorado; Oklahoma will leave hot temperatures and drought behind sometime this winter. When it breaks it's "going to break big time" Bledsoe said.

The driver for future weather change in Texas will be weather-maker storms on the West Coast this winter, which models indicate to be wetter than normal, Bledsoe told the group." "That's where our weather is going to come from," he told attendees, pointing to California and upper coastline states, where shades of blue on the map indicated moisture. Meanwhile, this winter, cold weather is predicted for November-January from the tip of Dallas up through the Midwest. Bledsoe said at least through the first couple of months the 2013 El Nino "will play some role in at least temperature," especially during the months of February, March and April. "It stands to reason Texas and the Gulf Coast will be colder than normal for winter," he said. "Moisture will come and East Texas is predicted to be wetter than normal."

The courses most popular sessions were weather outlook and rangeland management. Other sessions of interest looked at rebuilding the head with today's cattle prices and the benefits of the latest reproductive management strategies such as using sexed semen to assist in the rebuilding process.

The Beef Cattle Short Course happens annually at Texas A&M University and is beneficial to the experienced cattleman looking to increase his knowledge in a specific area or helpful to the absentee landowner looking for information prior to purchasing a few head of cattle. The 2013 Beef cattle Short course is scheduled for August 5-7.

The WEST COKE COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by -5.29 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). The average taxable value of a residence homestead in WEST COKE COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT this year is \$52,670. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.263890 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$138.99.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.249923 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$131.63.
