As we leave summer behind and move into fall and the hunting seasons are growing near, land managers begin to think what they could have done different to manage the wildlife populations to improve chances of having that trophy hunt this year. In many cases, now is the time to start the management practices to move your operation towards an intensive management practice.

As Dr. Dale Rollins says "the key to wildlife management is know your plants and knowing how to manipulate them". An easy way to manipulate the plants is known as discing, by dragging the disc through the land you are causing a soil disturbance and are moving the land from grassland to increasing the forb production. The three main species of wildlife that we all love here in Coke County are the deer, turkey and quail. All benefit from a small area of increased forb production.

For example when you increase forb production you also increase insect abundance in that area. The quail and turkey consume insects as a large part of their diet when they are available, which is due to the increased protein content of the insects. When you increase forb production you also increase the amount of seed producing plants. This provides more food for the quail, dove and turkey when the insects are not available.

The discing benefits the deer by increasing forb production in a small area of the pasture. Even though the deer do not consume insects or seeds they benefit by consuming the forbs. As a general rule the forbs are higher in protein content then the grass. And the deer will prefer to browse on the more nutritious plants that will be growing in the disc area.

The species of forbs that come up in a disc area can be determined by the time of year that you disc. For example when you disturb the soil in October you receive a mix-

ture of forbs that contain ragweed, sunflower and other various forbs when you disc in December you receive more of a monoculture of sunflowers. If your goal of wildlife management is to increase seed and insect production for quail, turkey and dove then December will be the best time to cause the soil disturbance. If you want to focus more on multispecies management you can benefit from causing a disturbance in October.
