FM roads serve a purpose

Decades ago, the farm-tomarket (FM) road system was established to bring products from Texas farms to markets. Those roads still do that today, but they also see more traffic.

"There are more vehicles on the road, and many people travel on our local FM roads," John Ross Copeland, Coke County Farm Bureau president, said. "But most people don't realize the reason these roads were built, which was to connect Texas farms and ranches directly to highways and other cities in order to move products."

Some of the highly traveled FM roads in Coke County include FM 2662 and FM 2034.

"These roads are a way for farmers and ranchers in the state to move equipment to and from fields," John Ross said. "It's also a way to move fertilizer, feed, fuel, seed, and more from manufacturers or retailers to the farm."

As traffic has increased on the roads, so do the chances of an accident.

"If you drive on our FM roads in the county, you'll meet farmers and ranchers like myself. They will probably be hauling livestock or moving large farm equipment and will likely be driving slower than the speed limit," John Ross said. "Slow down. Proceed with caution and give them some space. We're driving those roads to help bring food and fiber from the fields to our tables, stores, and kitchens."
